Final Edition



This will be the final edition of the Carillon Chimes. I have thought long and hard about this and discussed it with a number of people before deciding that the newsletter has run its course.

After 62 editions, five years' worth, there are a number of reasons I come to this decision, mainly:

Facebook

- i. Facebook is up to date, items can be posted as they happen so have much more relevance. Keeping back articles until the 1st of the following month makes no sense in this day and age.
- ii. We regularly get far more views on Facebook than the numbers who subscribe to the Carillon Chimes. For example the gentleman with the carillon blanket got 1500 views. Five times the numbers who subscribe (I won't to use the word read) to the newsletter.
- iii. The Facebook page is accessed by 'interested' individuals.
- iv. It is easier for those interested parties to interact with us and to make comments.
- v. There is no 'deadline'

The Website

- i. We (or rather Goff) have developed the new website, this where certain items should be appearing where they will be available for years to come.
- ii. There is a link to the website and to Facebook on every email I send.

There is of course some down sides, some people have a complete aversion to social media and will not access Facebook regardless of what we say and Loughborough Community Eye,

the free publication regularly reproduces stories from the *Carillon Chimes*. We will continue to send items of interest to them in the hope that they continue to use them.

You will see, that as yet, we have not decide on a name for this newsletter. It's up to you, pass your suggestions to Mel.


Christmas Cards


So if you want a unique card then visit the museum. They also sell a large range of other items with prices to suit all pockets.
